

JUSTICE ADMINISTRATION

EMPHASIS OF PROGRAM

The Justice program at Southwest Minnesota State University prepares students for careers in Police, Courts, Corrections and Prevention. It also educates them as citizens to engage as effective change agents.

This is a broad based liberal arts program designed for those who want to make a difference. You'll gain the tools and understandings necessary to work effectively within the current system and to transform it to create better justice, less crime and fewer social problems.

Our major has been certified by the Police Officer Standards and Training Board as meeting the education requirements for peace officers.* Completion of our program makes students eligible to continue their education for peace officers by completing a separate Skills training course. The education and the Skills are required before a student is eligible to sit for the peace officer exam.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The Justice Administration Program prepares students to work in a tremendous number of areas in local, state, and federal government as well as the private sector. The program integrates knowledge from all fields of justice to broaden understanding of police, courts, corrections and prevention. This gives our students the advantage of being able to transfer easily from one area of the justice system to another.

Graduates find jobs in community policing, probation, court services, child protection, juvenile facilities, prisons, educational settings, communities, substance abuse, conflict resolution, victim services, parole, case workers, correctional officers, counselors, private security, financial crime investigation, positive youth development, domestic violence advocacy, program evaluation, parks & recreation officers, investigators, criminological research.

A degree in Justice Administration is also excellent preparation for law school or for success in graduate school.

INTERNSHIPS

Through Justice Administration internships, students gain valuable work experience, and the field experience component provides students with an opportunity to apply what they have learned. Internship alternatives include working with police agencies, juvenile and adult facilities as well as state and federal agencies, the court system and corrections agencies.

Student can complete an internship anywhere in the country with an organization connected to justice.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Incoming students may be eligible for a number of academic and leadership scholarships through the Office of Admission. There may also be a scholarship available through University Public Safety in combination with employment.

YOUR FIRST CHOICE

The Justice Administration program at SMSU is student centered. According to student survey results, 96% of majors say, "the instructors care about students." 100% of majors think they are getting a good education and the same percentage say they enjoy their classes.

The Justice Administration program

- Takes a critical look at the criminal justice system including evidence-based assessments of what works and what doesn't work
- Enables you to understand and appreciate different situations and problems, and to communicate across different backgrounds, circumstances and predicaments
- Improves written and oral communication skills
- Teaches you how to manage, motivate and work effectively with people from all different backgrounds and how to be effective in an organization
- Introduces cutting edge solutions and innovative programs from around the country
- Provides opportunities to apply classroom knowledge to real life situations through service learning, class projects, community outreach and internships

We encourage students to double major or obtain at least one minor. Particularly marketable combinations with Justice Administration include Communication, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, Social Work, or Spanish.
