Dr. Gary Clayton Anderson teaches at the University of Oklahoma at Norman and specializes in ethnohistory and the history of Native Americans of the Great Plains and American Southwest. He is the author of *Little Crow: Spokesman for the Sioux* and editor of *Through Dakota Eyes: Narrative Accounts of the Minnesota Indian War of 1862*. He is the author of several other books and articles depicting the early history of the Dakota tribes and the changes that occurred after European contact. The 1997 revised edition of his book from the Minnesota Historical Society Press, *Kinsmen of Another Kind: Dakota-White Relations in the Upper Mississippi Valley, 1650-1862*, will be the text for his talk.
