# Professional Peace Officers Education (PPOE) Approved Courses and Forms Revised Spring 2025

This packet must be completed prior to graduation. Students can graduate with the Justice Administration major without intending to work as a peace officer in the State of MN, however for those who want to work in that capacity the following information must be completed.

Requirements for the Justice Administration Major – highlighted elective courses are required for students going into policing. An additional required course is PSYC 101, which is part of the Liberal Education Program and will count as a general credit; it is a prerequisite for PSYC 235, which is a required elective. NOTE: EMR is required for peace officer skills and must be completed prior to graduation; student must find a course outside of SMSU to meet this requirement.

## FIREARM POSSESSION STATUTE

### 624.713 CERTAIN PERSONS NOT TO POSSESS FIREARMS.

Subdivision 1. **Ineligible persons:** The following persons shall not be entitled to possess a pistol or semiautomatic military-style assault weapon or, except for clause (1), any other firearm:

(1) a person under the age of 18 years except that a person under 18 may carry or possess a pistol or semiautomatic military-style assault weapon (i) in the actual presence or under the direct supervision of the person's parent or guardian, (ii) for the purpose of military drill under the auspices of a legally recognized military organization and under competent supervision, (iii) for the purpose of instruction, competition, or target practice on a firing range approved by the chief of police or county sheriff in whose jurisdiction the range is located and under direct supervision; or (iv) if the person has successfully completed a course designed to teach marksmanship and safety with a pistol or semiautomatic military-style assault weapon and approved by the commissioner of natural resources;

(2) except as otherwise provided in clause (9), a person who has been convicted of, or adjudicated delinquent or convicted as an extended jurisdiction juvenile for committing, in this state or elsewhere, a crime of violence. For purposes of this section, crime of violence includes crimes in other states or jurisdictions which would have been crimes of violence as herein defined if they had been committed in this state;

(3) a person who is or has ever been committed in Minnesota or elsewhere by a judicial determination that the person is mentally ill, developmentally disabled, or mentally ill and dangerous to the public, as defined in section 253B.02, to a treatment facility, or who has ever been found incompetent to stand trial or not guilty by reason of mental illness, unless the person's ability to possess a firearm has been restored under subdivision 4;

(4) a person who has been convicted in Minnesota or elsewhere of a misdemeanor or gross misdemeanor violation of chapter 152, unless three years have elapsed since the date of conviction and, during that time, the person has not been convicted of any other such violation of chapter 152 or a similar law of another state; or a person who is or has ever been committed by a judicial determination for treatment for the habitual use of a controlled substance or marijuana, as defined in sections 152.01 and 152.02, unless the person's ability to possess a firearm has been restored under subdivision 4;

(5) a person who has been committed to a treatment facility in Minnesota or elsewhere by a judicial determination that the person is chemically dependent as defined in section 253B.02, unless the person has completed treatment or the person's ability to possess a firearm has been restored under subdivision 4. Property rights may not be abated but access may be restricted by the courts;

(6) a peace officer who is informally admitted to a treatment facility pursuant to section 253B.04 for chemical dependency, unless the officer possesses a certificate from the head of the treatment facility discharging or provisionally discharging the officer from the treatment facility. Property rights may not be abated but access may be restricted by the courts;

(7) a person, including a person under the jurisdiction of the juvenile court, who has been charged with committing a crime of violence and has been placed in a pretrial diversion program by the court before disposition, until the person has completed the diversion program and the charge of committing the crime of violence has been dismissed;

(8) except as otherwise provided in clause (9), a person who has been convicted in another state of committing an offense similar to the offense described in section 609.224, subdivision 3, against a family or household member or section 609.2242, subdivision 3, unless three years have elapsed since the date of conviction and, during that time, the person has not been convicted of any other violation of section 609.224, subdivision 3, or 609.2242, subdivision 3, or a similar law of another state;

(9) a person who has been convicted in this state or elsewhere of assaulting a family or household member and who was found by the court to have used a firearm in any way during commission of the assault is prohibited from possessing any type of firearm for the period determined by the sentencing court;

(10) a person who:

(i) has been convicted in any court of a crime punishable by imprisonment for a term exceeding one year;

(ii) is a fugitive from justice as a result of having fled from any state to avoid prosecution for a crime or to avoid giving testimony in any criminal proceeding;

(iii) is an unlawful user of any controlled substance as defined in chapter 152;

(iv) has been judicially committed to a treatment facility in Minnesota or elsewhere as a person who is mentally ill, developmentally disabled, or mentally ill and dangerous to the public, as defined in section 253B.02;

(v) is an alien who is illegally or unlawfully in the United States;

(vi) has been discharged from the armed forces of the United States under dishonorable conditions; or

(vii) has renounced the person's citizenship having been a citizen of the United States; or

(11) a person who has been convicted of the following offenses at the gross misdemeanor level, unless three years have elapsed since the date of conviction and, during that time, the person has not been convicted of any other violation of these sections:

609.229 (crimes committed for the benefit of a gang);
609.2231, subdivision 4 (assaults motivated by bias);
609.255 (false imprisonment);
609.378 (neglect or endangerment of a child);
609.582, subdivision 4 (burglary in the fourth degree);
609.665 (setting a spring gun);
609.71 (riot); or
609.749 (stalking).

For purposes of this paragraph, the specified gross misdemeanor convictions include crimes committed in other states or jurisdictions which would have been gross misdemeanors if conviction occurred in this state.

**AFFIRMATION:** I have read the above information and hereby certify that I am not considered ineligible to possess a pistol pursuant to MN Statute 624.713. In understand that should I become ineligible to possess a pistol pursuant any state or federal law while enrolled in the Peace Officer program, such ineligibility shall be grounds for dismissal.

## 6700.0700 MINIMUM SELECTION STANDARDS §Subpart 1.

## Selection standards.

An applicant identified by the board as eligible to be licensed or a peace officer currently licensed in Minnesota may apply for a peace officer position with a law enforcement agency. Prior to employment, the law enforcement agency must establish and document that the following minimum selection standards are met by the applicant. The applicant must:

A .be a citizen of the United States or eligible to work in the United States under federal requirements;
B. possess a valid Minnesota driver's license or, when residing in another state, a valid driver's license from that state;
C. provide a complete personal history using a form provided by the law enforcement agency and submit to a thorough background investigation conducted by the agency that meets the requirements of part 6700.0670;

As required by law, no student may be admitted to a professional peace officer education program who poses a threat to the health or safety of themselves or others or who has been convicted of any crime listed as a disqualification from appointment to the position of a peace officer.

If you have been convicted of any of the crimes listed below, you are not eligible to become a licensed peace officer. You may still complete a major in Justice Administration with the understanding that you will not be able to become a licensed peace officer in MN. Read through the following list of crimes for which a conviction would disqualify you from this profession and attest at the end that you have not been convicted of any of these or explain the circumstances. D. not been convicted of:

(1) a felony in Minnesota or an offense in another jurisdiction that would be a felony if committed in Minnesota;

(b) bias crimes, including assaults motivated by bias under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.2231, subdivision 4, and criminal damage to property under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.595,

subdivision 2, paragraph (b);

<u>(c) domestic assault under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.2242;</u> (d) violation of a domestic abuse no contact order under Minnesota Statutes, section 629.75, subdivision 2;

(e) violation of an order for protection under Minnesota Statutes, section 518B.01, subdivision 14;

(f) harassment or stalking under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.749;

(g) violation of a harassment restraining order under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.748, subdivision 6;

(h) sexual extortion under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.3458; (i) criminal sexual conduct under Minnesota Statutes, sections 609.341 to 609.3451;

(j) indecent exposure under Minnesota Statutes, section 617.23; (k) any mistreatment of a vulnerable adult, including under Minnesota Statutes, sections 609.2231; 609.231; 609.2325; 609.233; 609.2335; 609.234; and 609.72, subdivision 3; (1) patrons of prostitution <u>under Minnesota Statutes</u>, section 609.324, subdivision 2; (m) making false claims for profit to a public body or officer under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.465; (n) attempting medical assistance fraud under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.466; (o) theft under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.52, except that misdemeanor theft of movable property valued at \$500 or less is not an automatic disgualification; (p) interference with an emergency call under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.78, subdivision 2, clause (1); (q) nonconsensual dissemination of private sexual images under Minnesota Statutes, section 617.261; (r) interference with privacy under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.746; (s) malicious punishment of a child under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.377; (t) mistreating animals under Minnesota Statutes, section 343.21; (u) misconduct of a public officer or public employee under Minnesota Statutes, section 609.43; (v) narcotics or controlled substance law, excluding any nonfelony marijuana offenses; and (w) been required at any point in time to be registered as a predatory offender under Minnesota Statutes, section 243.166 or 243.167, or required to register as a sex offender in any other state at any point in time;

609.231 Mistreatment of Residents or Patients (may disqualify)

(1) a hate or extremist group as defined in part <u>6700.0100</u>, subpart 29; or
(2) a criminal gang as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section <u>609.229</u>, subdivision 1;

To be eligible to attend skills (which is a requirement) students will also need to

*H.be fingerprinted, and the fingerprints must be forwarded by the agency to the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The results of the fingerprint check must be maintained in the background investigation report;* 

*l*.be free from any physical condition that would adversely affect the performance of peace officer duties, as established through an exam by a licensed medical professional;

*J. have passed a psychological screening that meets the requirements of part 6700.0675; and* 

K. have completed training equivalent to or exceeding the requirements for emergency medical responder registration under Minnesota Statutes, section <u>144E.27</u>, <u>subdivision 2</u>, or to be completed within the first six months of employment.

[Students can use independent study credits to cover the EMR course if they meet with their advisor before registering and register for C/NC.]

\_\_\_\_\_Apply to Alexandria Technical & Community College, MN West at Worthington or another program for the Skills program. This application will include a <u>MMPI examination</u> and a <u>medical physical</u> - these exams need to be schedule by the student. Also, complete the <u>BCA</u> <u>background check</u> as well as any other forms in the application packet for the skills program.

[Students must have completed the requirements outlined above to be eligible for skills, once skills are complete the skills provider will relay that to the SMSU PPOE coordinator - who will sign off to allow you to take the POST Exam. On the off chance that you have "skills" that you did not pass, you will need to meet with the PPOE coordinator, BC Franson, to work out a remedial plan prior to being allowed to take the exam.]
